Teams of 3-5 students are tested in areas of:

- Microeconomics
- Macroeconomics
- International Economics.

- ✓ No formal courses in economics are required.
- ✓ Any team of students interested in economics is encouraged to compete.
- ✓ Schools may enter multiple teams in their qualifying divisions.
- ✓ Teams are encouraged to compete in the division that would challenge them the most.

Three Divisions: Adam Smith, David Ricardo, Milton Freidman

Adam Smith Division is for students enrolled in Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate, honors, or any other advanced courses in economics. The winning Arizona team from this division will compete in the National Semi-Finals, online, April 26th and the top 6 teams of the Natl. Semi-Finals will go on to compete in the National Finals in New York City, May 22-24, 2010

David Ricardo Division is for students enrolled in one-semester (or less) general economics course, or courses that include introductory economic concepts (social studies, business, personal finance, etc.) Questions in the David Ricardo Division have greater emphasis on economic application and less emphasis on economic theory. The winning Arizona team from this division will compete in an **Online** National Competition - David Ricardo Division (Date TBA)

Milton Freidman Division is restricted to middle school teams only. While middle school teams are welcome to play in a higher division (David Ricardo or Adam Smith), high school students are not eligible to compete in the Milton Freidman Division. State awards are given for this competition based on test performance. There is no semi-final or final competition for this division.
